Boating Safety, a priority

Your new board has been busy since last summer, working with volunteers on an updated Code of Conduct. It was reviewed with officials from the municipal government in Sainte-Agathe-des-Monts and mailed out to all residents at the end of 2019, along with the 2020 renewal notices. It will be finalized at our annual meeting and, in the meantime, will serve as a guideline for current and new residents of Lac Papineau.

Remember to follow Canada's Safe Boating Rules:

All persons who operate a pleasure craft must carry proof of competency on board if the pleasure craft has any type of motor, including an electric trolling motor, and is used for recreational purposes. A variety of documents may serve as proof of competency:

- *A Pleasure Craft Operator Card that you receive after passing a boating safety course approved by the Department of Transport or...*
- *Proof that you passed a boating safety course in Canada before April 1, 1999, or...*
- *A certificate from the List of Certificates approved by the Department of Transport or...*
- *A complete safety checklist for a rented boat- good only while the boat is rented.*

Age & Operator Restrictions:

- *Persons **under 12 years of age** who are not directly supervised by a person 16 years of age or older may only operate a pleasure craft propelled by a motor of **no more than 10 hp (7.5 kW)***
- *Persons **at least 12 years of age but under 16 years of age** who are not directly supervised by a person 16 years of age or older may only operate a pleasure craft propelled by a motor of **no more than 40 hp (30 kW)**.*

Enforcement: "Carry the Card"

15 years for the lake swim!

This year marks the 15th anniversary of our annual lake swim. It takes place at 10:00 on the first Saturday in August which, this year, is August 1. Everyone is invited to take part, either by swimming or by safely accompanying swimmers in your boats.

The Story of our Aerators

Have you ever wondered about the solar panels floating in the 3rd lake?

They power the aerators and are installed every May and removed every October by members of our Board, with help from volunteers. Until approximately 25-30 years ago, there was a fish farm upstream from Lac Papineau and the excrement has continued to seep into our lake ever since. This has resulted in high phosphate levels and a reduction of oxygen in the water. The aerators create a vortex-style column of water, which keeps the water moving. The colder water is brought to the surface and, because it is colder, it falls back again to the bottom, taking oxygen with it. The oxygen levels in the lake are very important, as they assist with composting of leaves, bird excrement and anything else that falls into the lake. The 3 aerators were installed 19 years ago, thanks to the hard work of our board and 45 residents who each donated \$500 to finance their cost. It took 2 years from planning to installation. Originally powered by wind, the aerators were upgraded to solar a few years ago. They have made an incredible improvement in the water quality of our lake since being installed. Lac Papineau is considered a controlled lake, because it has a dam which controls the flow of water for Riviere du Nord and further downstream. Originally, monitoring was done on our lake by government agencies but some years ago, our Association President recommended stopping the government monitoring of the water to minimize outside control of our lake.

Gate Code for Boat Launch

In order to better protect our lake environment, we are changing how we control the boat launch gate access this year. **When you pay your membership, you will be provided with the current gate code.** The codes will be changed by our webmasters on a regular basis.

Did You Know?

The Laurentian Mountains were originally settled by Indigenous peoples: the Algonquins in the 1400's, and then the Iroquois in the 1650's, who defeated the Algonquins. Expansion in the 19th century brought an influx of French farmers and, when the railways expanded north in the 1890's, English-speaking Montrealers began to arrive.

In the 1870's, the principal founder of Sainte-Agathe arrived. Augustin Morin was author of 92 resolutions of the Papineau Rebellion and co-author of the Civil Code of Lower Canada. Curée Labelle was also key in bringing development to the area.

A health spa opened in 1895, under the ownership of New York City nurse, Elizabeth Wand. It still operates as Auberge Tour du Lac.

The tuberculosis hospital was opened in 1899. It was burned to the ground in 1902 and was rebuilt as the Laurentian Chest Hospital, a sanatorium. It became the primary treatment centre for Canada's First World War soldiers who were subjected to gas attacks.

***Personal note:** the grandfather of this newsletter's editor spent 2 years there, following the Second World War, for tuberculosis treatment.*

A fire in 1907 destroyed most of rue St. Vincent.

In 1996, the rail-to-trail conversion took place, creating Le P'Tit Train du Nord. It runs 200 kms from St. Jerome to Mont-Laurier and is popular with hikers and cyclists in summer and snowmobilers in winter.
