WHAT ABOUT WATER TESTING?

Water testing comes in 3 categories: home tap water, lake fecal coliform levels by house, and the lake's overall environmental health.

1. It is the responsibility of each home owner to have his in-house tap water tested, should he wish to. H2O in Sainte Agathe will analyse the sample for a nominal charge of approximately \$75 and will let you know if your water is potable. (safe for drinking)
2. Testing for fecal coliform: this is done by taking lake water samples around the lake, in front of approximately every 3rd house. These samples are then sent for testing. Should any samples "fail" and indicate high levels of fecal coliform, further samples will be taken to narrow down the readings to an individual 1 or 2 houses. Those results will be forwarded to the Town of Sainte Agathe for action. **These tests are planned for mid-summer 2020** so, if you see Board members out getting samples, you will know what they are doing.
3. Environmental testing: this is not done every year, due to the high cost of hiring a team of biologists to perform the testing at different levels in the water, analyze the results and present recommendations. In 2020, we will be sending Requests for Proposal to 3 companies. **Stay tuned!**

Did You Know?

"Beam me up, Scottie!"

These words were made famous by Captain James T. Kirk in "Star Trek", a science fiction TV show, which started airing in 1966.

Captain Kirk was played by William Shatner, an actor born in NDG in Montreal in 1931. Shatner's family owned a cottage on Lac Papineau, near Hallas' place on Chemin Paiement. The original cottage has since been updated but the stone wall remains out front.

Shatner worked as a camp counselor at Camp B'Nai Brith and spent a lot of his leisure time at Hallas' Restaurant, the local kids' hang-out. Hallas' Restaurant offered dancing to music by local singers and Nickelodeon juke boxes.

In 2016, Shatner wrote a book titled "My Fifty-Year Friendship with a Remarkable Man", in which he describes his childhood in the Laurentians. Here is an excerpt:

"My childhood summers were spent at a cabin ... in the Laurentian Mountains north of Montreal, where I'm from. Our cabin fronted a dirt road, which is probably a highway now, and had a swinging screen door, the slap of which I'll always remember.It started off with three families on the lake. To get running water, we had to hand-pump it from a well to a cistern on the roof. When I was 5 or 6, I offered to fill each family's cistern for 25 cents, which was a fortune then. I hadn't realized how hard it was to pump the water, so I'd get a cistern half-filled and be so exhausted that I'd have to come back the next day. I was never able to top off a cistern. As the number of cabins increased over the years, a corner store finally sprang up. There was a group of 10 kids of different ages — I was around 11 or so — that would gather there on a Saturday night and dance to whatever was playing on the radio or to this French trio that would come and play country music. Around that time I started to notice girls — and actually caught my first glimpse of a naked girl. It was as memorable as catching my first fish. A friend of my older sister's was visiting our cabin, and while I was in my room at the top of the stairs (which had no door), the door to my sister's bedroom opened and I saw her friend Diane dressing. She caught me looking and slammed the door. That memory has stayed with me to this day."

Star Trek now has a cult following with annual conventions, where people dress like the show characters.

A few years ago, while going through some old pictures, the editor of this newsletter found a picture of her cousins and "Billy" Shatner on what is believed to be the current Lapkovsky beach, taken when all the boys were 9-14 years of age. I have hunted high and low for the picture but can't locate it. If I find it, I will post it in another newsletter.

- We are investigating the posting of a new sign on the boat launch gate, to raise awareness of the Myriophyllum (aka watermilfoil) invasive plant species. Other lakes have this type of signage and it has helped boaters identify the invasive plant and understand how each boater can make a difference in the prevention of its' spread.
- Have you noticed that, over the past few years, loon couples have returned to our lake? This is a sign of a healthy lake! However, have you also noticed that we never seem to see loon chicks? Given the potential for a lower level of motorized activity on the lake this summer, due to the pandemic, less noise and traffic in the south portion of the 3rd lake (in the area of the island) might positively impact the potential to see new generations of loons and other waterfowl to join us later in the summer. If possible, let's keep this in mind when out in our boats! **Let's make a difference!**
- Expect to see more bylaw inspectors on our lake this summer! The Town of Sainte Agathe des Monts has adopted some new rules around docks (shape, size, and number) and inspectors will be visiting lakes in the area this summer to ensure compliance. It is unclear yet whether there will be "grandfathering" in place for existing structures. We will update this information as we find out more.
